UPDATE FROM BISHOP RICHARD

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The Bible is full of stories about partnerships, from Moses and Aaron in the Old Testament to Paul and Barnabas in the New. The gentile churches of the Mediterranean partnered with the Jewish churches in Jerusalem to make sure gospel ministry flourished.

The Scriptures call us to work in partnerships both with each other, eg, in Ecclesiastes 4:9 *"Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labour"*, and with God himself, eg, 2 Corinthians 5:20 *"We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us"*.

I am really encouraged by the great partnerships that are taking place across our Diocese.

EVANDALE'S NEW VENTURE

'We've been a bit slow off the mark, but we think it's worth trying to save.' So began a conversation I had with the small but faithful committee who have run St Andrew's Church, Evandale for the past few years.

Yes, there was enough money for their contribution to Redress, but a new approach to ministry was clearly needed. St Andrew's is a prominent landmark in the town, but Evandale is too small a community to support a parish by itself.

With the reorganising of churches in Launceston, it was a logical step to link up with a larger and better resourced parish. The prominent Evandale


Markets take over the town on Sunday mornings, so Holy Trinity Launceston proposed the idea of church on Sunday evenings instead.

The small group that was meeting on Sunday evenings at Holy Trinity has moved and joined with Evandale parishioners to form the nucleus of a new venture. Early indications are very positive, with an average of over 20 people each Sunday evening. We want to see Jesus proclaimed in Evandale and for many to become his disciples. 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TOOLS TO FLOURISH AT WORK

How do you see your work? Or, perhaps more importantly, how do you think God sees your work? Is it merely a means to an end? Is it a place for evangelism? Or is it possible that your work could be an act of worship in and of itself?

It is so easy in church today to feel like there is a distinction, in the church's eyes, if not God's as well, between ministry and "secular work".

In her book, *Worship: How to Use Your Work to Worship God*, Kara Martin rejects this dichotomy and explores what a Biblical view of work looks like, presenting the concept of work as worship.

Kara presents six spiritual disciplines for work, ways that we can integrate our faith with our work. This book will help you to see how your work is part of living out your relationship with God and give you tools to flourish at work as you do.

CONNECTIONS IN QUEENSTOWN

The Parish of West Coast is making connections in the local community, with support from [Anglicare](#).

It began with the idea of transforming the church's storage shed into a place where people could gather once a week to share a meal. "The first time, there were a handful of people and it just grew from there," said parishioner Jack Edwards. "People said it would be a three week wonder, then a ten week wonder, that it would peter out eventually....but it hasn't".

Connections is now attracting around 40 people every week.

"We provide a healthy, nutritious meal and an opportunity for companionship," he said. "The evening has a vibrant atmosphere".

Anglicare gave the parish a grant for the project to assist with the cost of food, utensils and electricity.

"This is an outreach to have fellowship, so people can trust what the church is about," said Jack. "We have a meal and

a chat, then a few guys play guitar and sing along. People are seeing that this Christian mob aren't too bad".

"Because of Connections we now have volunteers who help, a women's group ready to cookpeople receiving prayer, counselling, kids coming along and around 20-30 people at church each week," he said. "These are all plusses".

The parish also delivers food hampers in the community, feeding a minimum of 40 families each week.

For the past 14 years [Launceston Church Grammar School](#) has partnered with the Sony Foundation to host a summer camp for children with disabilities.

In December, the School welcomed 19 children for a three-day camp with Grade 11 and 12 students on hand to assist.

The Senior Campus hosted indoor play, craft, bikes and golf buggies. The camp featured a "construct a gingerbread house" session, beeswax wrap creation, water fight, and a baby animal session which included bunnies, therapy dogs, a guide dog puppy, goats, a blind alpaca and a visit from Gavin the fat cat.

With 12 campers on the autism spectrum the School invested in some tactile toys and set up a

sensory room, which were both well utilised.

A disco, Christmas chapel with nativity costumes, lots of craft, and a visit to the Junior Campus ensured that campers had a rewarding and memorable time.

Part of the Anglican Church's Vision is to develop partnerships with our Anglican Schools with an expectation that parishes will support, encourage and pray for them.

GOD'S LOVE IN ACTION

The recent bushfires saw members of our church actively involved in mission, showing God's love in practical ways and being a people of blessing to our communities ([view video](#)).

The Tasmanian Council of Churches (TCC) Emergencies Ministry provides psychological first aid and pastoral, emotional and spiritual care to

people affected and touched by disaster and emergency.

They were most recently deployed throughout the fires of February and March 2019. During this period, about 60 TCC Emergencies Ministry volunteers and staff provided more than 1000 hours of time across 10 locations around Tasmania. These deployments included the evacuation and recovery centres in Huonville, Bothwell, Queenstown and Kingston, as well as the Tasmanian Emergency Information Services' community 'hubs'.

TCC Emergencies Ministry enables the church to assist people hurt by fire, flood or another crisis. This ministry is an incredibly important part of the church demonstrating God's love in action.
