UPDATE FROM BISHOP RICHARD

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

With the 50th anniversary of the moon landing last month, I have been reflecting on Psalm 8. *When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is mankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them?* The answer of course, is we are children of God, made in his image to be good stewards of his world. This is a high calling for each one of us.

Our Synod met in Launceston 14-15 June. It was wonderful to gather as a Diocesan family to work on the business of our common life. The agenda was full and covered new governance legislation for our Parishes. My [Presidential Address](#), information about [General Motions](#) passed and the [Registrar's Report](#) to all electors are on our website. We made a commitment to work on indigenous reconciliation and considered some motions about our relationships in the wider Anglican Communion.

Given the current housing and homelessness situation in Tasmania I commend the Vicar-General's [Pastoral Letter](#) to you. It is a matter we should all be concerned about. Our Vision is to be *a Church for Tasmania*, so I am heartened that many in our churches are concerned about these things.

This newsletter is full of stories of our Church engaging with and being a blessing to our community. Well done and keep up the great work! I'm also encouraged by our Ministry Leaders who visited the UK that: (1) we are on the right track; and (2) that God will equip us to break new ground.

In May a group of our Ministry Leaders (some Rectors and the Anglicare Parish Development Worker) travelled to the UK to attend the Alpha Global Leadership Conference, and to see some of the new things happening in the Church of England.

It was great to get out of our context and to see what the world-wide church is doing. The group returned to Tasmania encouraged, bursting with new ideas and spiritually revitalised. They also deepened their relationships with each other which has led to greater support and prayer.

Some of the key things we learnt were:

- The importance of generosity and hospitality.
- The Church of England has some great examples of very old church buildings transformed into flexible multipurpose spaces for ministry.
- Developing lots of leaders intentionally at all levels of church is vital and needs more resources.

- Leadership takes sacrifice. One speaker asked, "Could it be that the difference between where you are and where God wants to take you is the painful decision you are unwilling to make?"
- Anglican Churches are planting new churches and congregations and joining in networks as a key strategy for reaching the communities around them.
- Churches are being bold in local mission, and God is changing what they believe is possible.
- The Anglican Church in Tasmania is already doing a lot of things that leaders in other Dioceses would like to see happen in their own context, with our focus on making disciples as our vision, and using structures and resources to make that happen.

We came back excited that we are on the right track in Tasmania, but also that God has many more possibilities for us in the years ahead.

TINY HOUSE RESPONSE TO LOCAL NEED

There are few crisis accommodation options on the east coast. The opportunity to buy a tiny house was identified by Anglicare as worth pursuing. The local Parish of Break O'Day supported the project and agreed for the tiny house to be located at the back of St Paul's Church.

"Homelessness has become more visible in St Helens over the years," said Anglicare community support worker Thom Ryan. "There are people about the town who you can see are sleeping rough."

Parish of Break O'Day minister Alexander Withers said parishioners

were eager to be part of offering a practical response. "Since Anglicare first moved into the cottage next to the church, the awareness of homelessness and people in need has skyrocketed," said Revd Withers. "The health and wellbeing of the wider community is now one of our top concerns."

The parish operates a furniture shed and has an arrangement with a local bakery to distribute bread two nights each week.

The tiny house was converted from a shipping container by local TasTAFE students and is complete with

sleeping, kitchen-dining and wet areas (with shower, toilet and a washing machine). It is connected to mains electricity, water and sewerage, and has a heat pump.

The tiny house can accommodate either a single person or a couple for short term stays of up to six weeks. It provides guests with breathing space while they look for more permanent accommodation. **Enquiries can be made through Anglicare's Housing Connect Program - 1800 800 588**

A LIGHT REPAST

In the midst of a dark festival the light shone from the Cathedral. In celebrating 200 years of continuous Christian worship on its site in the heart of Hobart St. David's held A Light RePast, a digest of visual arts, music and written Word. There were artworks, including the building itself, with power spotlights turning the Nativity Window into a night-time display. Numerous recitals of flute, piano and organ music enlivened the 12 days of the festival. Each day there was the public reading of the Scriptures by Christians from Churches around Hobart.

The centrepiece was an artwork by Maz Gill-Harper featuring two coffins, showing there are two ways to die - one way leading to death, another to life and the dividing line is the blood of Christ. One visitor was moved to tears as she realised that Jesus has moved her from one coffin to the other.
