New Town and Lenah Valley Anglican is an evangelical Anglican parish centred in the inner northern suburbs of Hobart, Tasmania. We are seeking to appoint a minister of the gospel who will have special responsibility for establishing effective discipleship pathways and leading ministries for youth (tweens and teens) and their families, and general ministry responsibility assisting the Senior Minister with Bible teaching, preaching, service leadership, and pastoral care. This is a full-time position to be remunerated at the rate of Diocesan clergy.

We are seeking a person with a mature faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour who is eager to lead people to faith in Christ and teach them to become disciple-makers. Applicants will have demonstrated skills and a passion for ministry with youth and their families. They will be committed to creating a safe environment for younger people to experience Jesus through God's word and Spirit.

Our Associate Minister will be an ordained Anglican with relevant theological education (completed degree level or nearing completion) and ministry experience. The Senior Minister may consider a suitably trained and experienced person offering for ordination (subject to acceptance by the Bishop of Tasmania). He or she will serve as part of a ministry leadership team which includes the Senior Minister, Children's Minister (10 hours per week), and two honorary Assistant Ministers.

Applicants must affirm a personal commitment to an orthodox, biblical expression of Anglican identity and belief. They should be familiar with and able to affirm the Diocesan Vision available from the Senior Minister or the Diocese of Tasmania website (anglicantas.org.au/our-vision-for-tasmania).
